Y7 Trip to Battle Abbey— Thursday 24 September

After a rather long coach journey, we arrived at Battle Abbey where we were introduced to a man dressed as an Anglo Saxon. He talked to us about the events of 1066. Hearnt a lot about what happened during the actual battle - how the Normans had quite a few archers and the Anglo Saxons had hardly any. He told us that the Anglo Saxons used their shields to create a wall by linking them together making it very hard for the Normans to attack as it acted like a brick wall. However, this unfortunately eventually crumbled giving the Normans the victory.





Not long after the talk we were split into two groups - the Normans and the Anglo Saxons. I was an Anglo Saxon and we were each given shields. We went outside to re-enact the events of the battle, without hitting one another.

After the talk and a brief break for lunch we returned inside to watch a short film about the events of 1066 which, I found, very interesting. The film helped us to imagine what it would have been like if we were there, watching the events unfold before our own eyes. When the film finished we went back outside to walk around the field where the actual battel took place. It was quite steep and I could sympathise with the Normans as they were up and down the slope all day - it must have been exhausting!

Last but not least, we were given a tour of Battle Abbey School by one of the monks. It was very interesting as he explained there are lots of unexplored places within the school. The doors are permanently locked and they cannot be knocked down or opened to see what is behind them as the Abbey is a listed building.

In the entrance to the school there is a massive painting on the wall which is, in fact, the largest canvas painting in the country. After the tour we had tea in the Library which, I am sure, everyone will agree was an excellent way to end such an informative trip. We all gained a better understanding of the events of 1066.

Y8 Trip to Dover Castle— Friday 18th September 2015

We visited the wartime tunnels which were first used as an air raid shelter but were later used as an underground hospital during the evacuation of Dunkirk in 1940, or as some people might know it, 'Operation Dynamo' or 'D-day'. The leader of Operation Dynamo was a man called Admiral Sir Bertram Ramsay who was born on 20 January 1883 in London, and died on 2nd January 1945 aged 61. He was in the royal navy from 1898 - 1945.

The aim of the operation was to evacuate up to 40,000 troops who were under attack. With the British and French armies cornered by the advancing German army near Dunkirk, Kent became the focus of the nations attention as, between 26 May - 3 June, more than 330,000 troops were rescued from the beaches in one of the most astonishing operations of the war.

On 29 May many privately owned boats sailed to Dunkirk to help ferry the troops to safety. This flotilla of small vessels became famously known as the 'Little Ships'. All available seaworthy craft in Kent were assembled in Sheerness dockyard before making the hazardous crossing in flotillas to Dunkirk.



Dover was the busiest of the berthing ports during the frantic seven days of the evacuation. Here, ships were unloaded and re-fueled before returning to the French coast, while trains shuttled the arriving soldiers away from the coast.

We visited various rooms in the tunnels. The first room we entered was a reconstructed air raid shelter where we listened to a radio broadcast.

The next room we went in to contained a few benches and we listened to another radio broadcast, some music from the past and learnt a few facts about the war.

In the last room we went into we learnt all about WWII. There was one large projector showing the people stranded on the beach in Dunkirk being closed in on by the Germans, with the German air force up above watching out for big boats farther out to sea coming to rescue the poor English fighters.

We went to look around an Anglo - Saxon church in the grounds of Dover Castle, St. Mary de Castro, possibly built by William the Conqueror.



We also went to see the Stone Keep Castle which was built by Henry II in the 1180's. We saw the banqueting hall which contained lots of tables placed around the perimeter, with the kings chair at one end of the room.

We then went into a bedroom. The beds were very small because people were encouraged to sleep propped up by cushions as they believed this would help them

breathe more evenly and prevent them choking.

We went to the kitchen area in the Keep. Meat was hung up by wire and the food was cooked in metal pans over a wood fire. Dotted around the kitchen were lots of large rounded cooking bowls with long wooden stirrers. Clothing hung up to dry in the corners of the room. It must have been a very noisy workplace.
